Jennifer Lester, music director

Jennifer Lester, Founder and Music Director of The Seraphim Singers, is among the outstanding choral conductors of her generation. Critically acclaimed for creative programming and well-known as an unflagging advocate of new music, Ms. Lester presents emotional and musically engaging performances of challenging but rewarding repertoire. Ms. Lester has commissioned works from both nationally known and local living composers, including Avner Dorman, Shruthi Rajasekar, Christina Whitten Thomas, Carson Cooman, Julian Wachner, and James Woodman. She is committed to diversifying the choral repertoire,



programming and commissioning music by women and non-white composers. Ms. Lester has served as Music Director at the Church of Our Saviour in Brookline and as Associate Music Director and Organist of Saint Paul Parish in Cambridge. She is a past Dean of the Boston Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Also a Fulbright scholar, Ms. Lester holds a Bachelor's degree from the New England Conservatory of Music, and a Master of Music in choral conducting from Yale University.

Louise Mundinger, organist

Louise Mundinger is Music Director at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston, where she conducts the Choral Scholars and convenes a weekly meeting of musicians from the Diocese of Massachusetts. She has recently launched a series of concerts called "Embrace Ambiance" to showcase the acoustics at the Cathedral. She is grateful to her teachers from Valparaiso University, where she studied with William Eifrig and Philip Gehring, and the New England Conservatory, where she studied with Yuko Hayashi and Christa Rakich. She is a past Dean of the Boston Chapter of the American Guild of Organists (AGO), and was chair of the New Music Committee for the AGO.

She works to introduce music for the pipe organ to new audiences and loves it when people hear the stories music tells in her performances. "I heard that!" is what she wants for all audience members. Mundinger has performed organ recitals in France and Germany, and facilitated a biannual music exchange between Milton Academy and *L'Ecole de Musique de Persan* (France) for twenty years, supported in part by the Florence Gould Foundation.

Louise Mundinger was a recipient of the Frank Huntington Beebe award for musicians, which allowed her to study organ performance with



Zsigmond Szathmáry in Freiburg, Germany and perform concerts. She was a prize winner in the San Anselmo Organ Improvisation Competition and has been commissioned to write new music by, among others, the American Guild of Organists, The American Composers Forum (the Faith Partners Program), and the Diocese of Massachusetts. Her articles have appeared in *The American Organist* and *Musforum*. In 2008 Louise Mundinger was awarded the Talbot Baker Teaching Award at Milton Academy.

Series our programming is the exploration of deeply human themes: longing, protest, suffering, transcendence, hope, and joy. We use choral music to illuminate and challenge us to act on pressing issues in our world, including homelessness, climate change, and racial justice.

Felix Mendelssohn (1809–1847) – There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob

Jakob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy, widely known as Felix Mendelssohn, was a German organist, conductor, and composer of the early Romantic period. After a long period of denigration following his death, because of his Jewish heritage and growing anti-Semitism, his music is now frequently performed and highly regarded. On today's program is the well-known SATB chorus, "There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob" from the unfinished oratorio *Christus*. To close the movement, Mendelssohn employs the chorale "How brightly shines the morning star," still sung in churches today.

Volker Wangenheim (1928–2014) – Surge Illuminare Jerusalem

Volker Wangenheim was a Berlin-based conductor, professor, and composer. The text of this five-voice motet, *Surge, illuminare, Jerusalem,* is from the Book of Isaiah. Wangenheim uses a longer version than most composers, telling a deeper story with changing affects throughout. To tell that story, he uses a variety of harmonic textures and effects. Listen, for example, for the shimmery chords on *"illuminare"* and the complex harmonies on "tenebrae".

Daryl Bichel (b. 1950) – O Savior Rend the Heavens Wide

Daryl Bichel, organist, singer, and president of the board for Seraphim, composed this setting of the German chorale, "O Heiland reiss die Himmel auf," capturing both the gloom and darkness of night and sin as well as the joyous expectation of the light as reflected in the season of Advent. The opening and conclusion of the work feature trumpet fanfares and the organ in dialog with energetic singing by the choir. The organ, with its many colors and dynamic levels, plays both supportive and independent roles in this piece.

Heinrich Schütz (1585–1672) – Magnificat (Meine Seele erhebt den Herren)

Heinrich Schütz, often referred to as the "father of German music," was the first German composer of international stature, known primarily for his sacred vocal music. *The Magnificat* or *Canticle of Mary* is a text attributed to Mary, the mother of Jesus, found in the Gospel of Luke. Schütz's setting features two four-part choirs accompanied by basso continuo. The two choirs frequently echo each other, and within each choir staggered entrances create sections of energetic polyphony, as if each entering voice was catching the excitement of the others.

Louis-Claude Daquin (1694–1772) – Noël/Je suis L'Archange de Dieu

Louis-Claude Daquin (also called D'Aquino, d'Aquin, or d'Aquin) was a virtuoso organist and harpsichordist and a composer. A child prodigy and celebrity in his own time, his dazzling performances drew large crowds and the attention and admiration of the aristocracy. His compositions were admired for their gentle charm.

"Je suis L'archange de Dieu" is a cheerful, child-like traditional French carol. The music uses simple, catchy rhythms mirroring the lighthearted French poetry it sets. As we hear the repetition back and forth between the upper and lower voices, we can picture Daquin at the harpsichord, playfully passing the repeated motif from hand to hand. The result is a lively carol that is fun to sing and hear.

James Woodman (b. 1957) – The Midwife's Tale

James Woodman was the first composer-in-residence at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston and is frequently commissioned as a composer of organ and choral works. *The Midwife's Tale*, written for choir and organ or string quartet, was commissioned by The Boston Cecilia in 1996. The composer's notes on the piece introduce us to the text:

Although they have faded from view now, vibrant legends about the life of Christ flourished in medieval times, frequently eclipsing the Bible itself in influencing art and literature. The text of The Midwife's Tale is derived from one such narrative found in the Arundel manuscript, a compilation of earlier sources which dates from the 8th century. It contains an extraordinary account of the Nativity by the apocryphal figure of Zachel, a midwife enlisted by Joseph to attend to Mary at the time of birth. Against a dramatic background of cosmic upheaval Zachel tells the story of her astonishing experience: the birth she has witnessed is not one of a human child, for Mary has given birth to Light! Her awe, comprehension, and delight warmly invite our empathy."

This moment of Divine transformation is so pivotal that time seems to stop, and echoes of past promises and the hopes of thousands of people across thousands of years find fulfillment. Woodman has subverted the expectations in the nativity story, naming the first movement "The End" and the last movement "The Beginning." The birth of the Christ child marks the end of the long wait for the promised Messiah and the beginning of the gift of Jesus' life on earth.

Abbie Betinis (b.1980) – Song of the Pines

Composer Abbie Betinis comes from a family of composers. Her great-grandfather composed original Christmas carols that he included with Christmas greeting cards and Abbie restarted the family tradition. "Song of the Pines" was her new carol for 2005.

She writes, "The inspiration for...'Song of the Pines' came this year from my mother, a visual artist who designs our annual card....a simple pinecone image on white and silver paper mounted on dappled light blue card stock..." evoking the shores of Lake Superior, where her great-grandfather raised his family.

The melody of the carol, carried by the altos, evokes the wistful and reflective mood of a snowy winter night. The other voices enter with countermelodies one at a time, creating an organic increase in volume and intensity throughout the first four verses. In the last verse the voices enter softly in exact unison, growing in volume and diverging into harmony, only to calm and settle into the final major chord.

John Jacob Niles (1892-1980) (arr. John Rutter, b. 1945) – I Wonder as I Wander

John Rutter is an English composer and conductor known for his sacred choral works. His shorter pieces and arrangements of Christmas carols have become choral standards.

"I Wonder as I Wander" was inspired by the fragment of a song collected by musical folklorist and singer John Jacob Niles, who heard it sung by a girl in Appalachian North Carolina. Rutter's arrangement of Niles' song begins with a solo voice. Other parts enter with their own melodic lines, giving the piece more movement and impetus as it develops. The sopranos sing the tune in the final verse, this time with the other voices humming an accompaniment, as the piece comes to a quiet and peaceful end.

Edward Henry Margetson (1891–1962) – He Stooped to Bless

Edward Margetson was a pianist, organist, and composer originally from St. Kitts in the West Indies. Along with his sister Marie, he organized the Schubert Society in the interest of raising standards of sacred music in the African American community, and the society is credited with opening doors for black classical musicians in established orchestras in New York.

At first, "He Stooped to Bless" sounds much like a hymn or chorale, but it complicates the form with sections suggesting multiple voices and melodies and moving through different tonalities. This fluidity allows Margetson to employ text painting in his setting, notably for the repeating phrase "may rise," which moves higher each time, and in the use of a descending motif for "Because he stooped."

Thomas W. Talley (1870 – 1952) (arr. Jason Robison) – Behold That Star

Although Thomas W. Talley was researcher of chemistry at Fisk University, he was also a skilled musician who made great contributions to the study of Black folk music and folk tales. Talley sang and toured with the New Fisk Jubilee Singers, an ensemble of Black singers that included many former slaves among its members. While seeking a Christmas spiritual for the Jubilee Singers, he realized that none of the jubilee songs he knew pertained to Christmas, so he created an original carol, "Behold That Star," written in the spiritual style.

Robison's arrangement of Talley's carol features three sections—a beginning section that alternates between a soloist and a choral refrain, a second section where a choral ostinato is built from the bass up to soprano before the soloist comes in on top of it all, and a third section in which the "solo line" is sung by the choir in harmony while the soloist soars above them in a joyful conclusion.

Surge, illuminare, Jerusalem

Wangenheim *Text:* Isaiah 60:1-3, 10, 14-16 (sung in Latin)

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you. See, darkness covers the earth and thick darkness is over the peoples, but the Lord rises upon you and his glory appears over you. Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.

The children of your oppressors will come bowing before you; all who despise you will bow down at your feet and will call you the City of the Lord, Zion of the Holy One of Israel.
